- The current Official Plan was amended in June 2018








What is an Official Plan?

- Determines the land uses for the entire city
- Plans connections to roads, parks, open spaces and trails
- Helps to identify infrastructure and servicing needs for the next 25 years
- Plans for the protection of natural heritage and green spaces









- St. Thomas is growing and the Official Plans helps to prepare for that growth to the year 2046
- To align with Provincial Planning policies:
 - Provincial PolicyStatement (PPS) 2020
 - Provincial Planning Act (updated 2020)



Preliminary Urban Design Vision

The City of St. Thomas is committed to promoting a consistent and high standard of urban design for all development in the City, which responds to the needs of a growing and thriving community that is sustainable, inclusive and celebrated while remaining connected to its rich cultural heritage.



The eight design principles reflect current design best practices and principles, and are based on St. Thomas' strategic directions and policies, providing high level direction on future development in St. Thomas.

- Human Scale within Urban Fabric
- Safe, Attractive and Green Streetscapes
- High Quality Materials and Building Design
- Sustainable Development
- Heritage Preservation, Sensitive Integration

- Accessibility / Universal Design







Place Making: Engage in placemaking by creating memorable, flexible, and identity-strengthening spaces in both the private and public realms of the City.









Human Scale within Urban Fabric: Create built environments (i.e. building massing, scale, details) that support comfortable, desirable and active lifestyle and pedestrian experience, while complementing the character of the existing urban fabric.









Safe, Attractive and Green Streetscapes: Create vibrant, well-designed, safe, and pedestrian-oriented streets that support mobility for cyclists, pedestrians, and vehicles. Additionally, promote higher quality landscape treatments that integrate the benefits of climate comfort, stormwater management, urban forestry, and urban ecology.







High Quality Materials and Building Design: Promote high quality features, materials, and colours that enhance the neighbourhood/streetscape character, for both residential and commercial developments. Promote urban forms and architectural design that bring interest and diversity to the public realm.







Sustainable Development: Promote sustainability at all levels of city-building through urban design: green infrastructure; green building practices; climate change resiliency; renewable and low-carbon energy and design initiatives; native plants; and material selections.









Heritage Preservation, Sensitive Integration: Protect and celebrate St. Thomas' cultural heritage resources and rail history, and promote adaptive re-use of existing historic built form. Ensure new commercial and residential developments successfully contribute to the streetscape, landscape and district/site historic values and character.







Natural Heritage: Promote protection, enhancement, views and education on the City's rich natural heritage system









Accessibility/Universal Design: Provide designed spaces that reinforce inclusivity, and allow users of all abilities and to access, navigate, interact and explore without physical and perceived barriers.


