

ANALYSIS

Recently, Mr. Twaites requested the City's Environmental Services Department to review and address his concerns regarding a drainage problem in the rear yard of his property. Environmental Services staff of both the Engineering and Operations Divisions have met recently with Mr. Twaites, however, there was little that could be done by the City at this time to remedy this problem, since the subject drainage problem is fully located on private property and, also, since a solution to this long existing problem would require a capital expenditure to be made by the owner(s) of the properties that are affected or contribute to this drainage problem, all in compliance with City policy.

On September 9, 2005, Alderman David Warden and the writer attended at 95 Park Avenue to conduct a further field review of this matter with Mr. Twaites. Following this meeting, Environmental Services provided a written assessment and chronology of this issue to Mr. Twaites. A copy of this correspondence is attached herewith for the information of the Members.

Staff will be pleased to answer any questions regarding this matter at the meeting of October 11, 2005.





RE: Drainage Problems in Rear Yard at 95 Park Avenue

Further to our meeting of September 9, 2005, to review the drainage problems in the rear of your property, the following is being noted in response to your enquiries respecting the nature and the background to this drainage matter:

- The north east corner of your property appears to have received for a very long time the surface runoff that is generated by a number of neighbouring back yards, particularly the residential properties that front onto Young Street, which is approximately 3.5m higher than Park Avenue. This is also evidenced by the contour drawings which are on file in the City Engineering department as well as the plan/profile drawings of Young Street dating back to July 1965.
- During September 1987, the City's Engineering Staff was requested to comment on the rear yard flooding problem at 95 Park Avenue. A copy of the memorandum that was prepared at that time is enclosed herewith for your information.
- During April 2002, the then owner of the property at 95 Park Avenue installed a "Big O" drain between the rear yard and the Park Avenue curb to assist with the drainage relief that is needed for the rear yard.
- During March 2003, the rear yard at 95 Park Avenue experienced additional flooding, which appears to have been worsened as a result of the construction of a swimming pool and associated addition of placement of fill in the adjoining back yard of the property at 93 Park Avenue.
- The attached excerpt of the City's storm sewer plan confirms that there is no storm sewer available along the Park Avenue frontage of your property. As a result, there is no ability for the property owner to connect a storm drain to an existing and available storm sewer outlet.

- We understand that, about one year ago, you purchased this property at 95 Park Avenue, however, the City's property file does not have a copy of your solicitor's request for a property search letter which normally is being prepared for a property purchaser as background information to the property transaction.
- TCG Asphalt and Construction Inc., recently placed an amount of fill material within the rear yard of your property. The placement of this material was done at your sole request on or about July 25, 2005, to Mr. Jim Davidson of TCG. (A copy of the letter and statement in this regard by Mr. Hamstra of TCG is attached herewith for your information).

Upon review of the above, we must conclude that the drainage problem within the rear yard of your property is a problem that has existed for a very long time as the rear yard of your property is the lowest of a number of surrounding and long existing privately owned properties and also as a result of the lack of an available storm sewer outlet. In summary, we regret to inform you that there is little that can be done to correct this drainage problem other than the installation of a storm drain with catchbasin along the east side of your property line to Park Avenue as well as the construction of a storm sewer outlet along Park Avenue (if possible). In accordance with the City's local improvement policies, the capital funding of this private and local drainage problem would need to be provided by the benefiting property owner(s).

We trust the above is adequate for your present purposes. Please contact the undersigned at 631-1680 (ext 41675) or Mr. Brian Clement, Manager of Engineering if you have any questions.

Re: Drainage Problem - 95 Park Avenue '

I discussed the complaint with Mr. Depoorter at the site on Friday, September 25th. A rear yard flooding problem has been created by the construction of a pool and filling of the rear yard of 93 Park Avenue (Avery Rupple).

I advised him that there is no City By-law or Provincial legislation which would force Mr. Rupple to correct the problem. Unfortunately there is nothing that the City can do.

To correct the problem the owner is considering filling approximately one-quarter of the rear yard, up to a foot depth, to direct the water back onto the Rupple property. As an alternative, I suggested that he have the elevations checked to determine if a Big 'O' tile could be run from the low spot to the curb.


It was left with the owner to determine the most economical alternative.

This letter is to confirm the circumstances involved with the fill that was dumped at 95 Park Ave. in St. Thomas. TCG Asphalt was doing some reconstruction work at the Central Elgin Collegiate on Chestnut Street. It had come to our attention that a Mr. Ken Thwaites at 95 Park Ave was looking for a load of fill to be dumped in his back 'ard. Our foreman, Jim Davidson, went to see Mr. Thwaites to confirm what he wanted and agreed to bring a load of fill. After the load was dumped, Mr. Thwaites asked for two more loads to be brought which TCG did. The City of St. Thomas was not involved in this private agreement between TCG and Mr. Thwaites. RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that:

- 1. St. Thomas Ford Lincoln Sales be awarded Tender No. 05-100 for the supply of six (6) pickup trucks at a total tender price of \$180,153.72 plus GST., and,
- 2. Staff proceed with the purchase of required after market extras for the six (6) vehicles with a total cost of \$14,000 plus GST., and,
- 3. The total cost of \$194,153.72 plus GST., be charged to the corresponding approved Capital accounts 11-8-01-9-5137-6110 to 11-8-01-9-5142-6110 respectively.

Report:

Origin

At the meeting of September 6, 2005 Council approved report ES80-05 and authorized a tender call for six (6) vehicles with a previously estimated replacement cost of \$245,000 including vehicles and after market extras. It was expected that this bulk tender would provide a cost avoidance of approximately \$62,950.

Analysis

Tender No. 05-100 was advertised in the Times Journal on Saturday September 10 and was also posted on the City's website. Nine tender packages were issued directly to the following area dealers;

- Eastway Ford
- Talbot Ford
- Elgin Chrysler
- Disbrowe Motors
- Miller Ford (Rodney)
- Forham Motors (Rodney)
- Co-Trac Ford (Dutton)
- Mike Hutchison Motors (Aylmer)
- Dempsey Chrysler (Aylmer)

As advertised, Tender No. 05-100 closed on Tuesday September 27 @ 12:00 noon and 2 bids were received and opened from;

- Elgin Chrysler Ltd (informal/incomplete bid, could not meet the specification on one truck)
- St. Thomas Ford Lincoln Sales totaling \$180,153.72 plus GST.

In addition to the six (6) vehicles provided through Tender No. 05-100, there are a number of after market extras that are more efficiently added after the delivery of the trucks takes place. Examples of these are considered part of the vehicle replacement such as license transfer, bed liners, snowplough /harness etc. These items are estimated to cost less than \$14,000 plus GST.

In summary, the total replacement cost for the six (6) vehicles is \$194,153.72 with a cost avoidance of approximately \$95,000, which is \$32,000 more than expected.

Alternatives None at this time.



RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that:

- 1. The following be received for information; and,
- 2. A tender be developed for 6 similar replacement vehicles from the 22 vehicles listed in the 2006 ES Capital Needs list; and,
- 3. A report be brought back to Council for approval of the successful bidder with the funding source being the vehicle/equipment reserve account.

Report:

Origin

Two vehicles have recently been taken off the road as not operational, which are shown in the chart below as PW283 & PK314. These two vehicles cannot be returned to the road unless the required \$14,500 maintenance is completed to pass the safety inspection. A short list of six vehicles that have similar specifications has been developed which, if tendered ahead of the 2006 budget deliberations, could result in a cost avoidance total of approximately \$63,000 on the 2005/2006-vehicle maintenance operating budgets.

There are a total of 22 vehicles that have been identified and require replacement in 2006. They form part of the Treasury Memo submitted on August 9, 2005 for the capital budget submission from the Environmental Services Department. A number of these vehicles have already been held over from 2004 and 2005 as indicated in Report ES21-05 Fleet Replacement Needs (attached) that was deferred to the 2005 budget discussions.

Analysis

While all 22 vehicles have been prioritized by the Environmental Services Department, they are all at or beyond their expected lifespan as of 2005. Once vehicles are at their expected lifespan, major mechanical work or bodywork may not give a good return on investment.

There have been several recent mechanical/physical failures, which have been short-listed as 6 vehicles that have similar specifications, some need substantial work but all require replacement to avoid major repair and/or vehicle lease. The other important aspect of this analysis is the fact that some vehicles require immediate substantial mechanical work and bodywork in order to pass the standard safety requirements.

The chart below shows the immediately required maintenance costs (mechanical and body work) along with recent annual maintenance costs and the 2005 replacement cost before our investigation.

It was discussed with purchasing staff and decided that grouping the 6 vehicles together may result in cost savings. While actual figures are only known following a full tender process, preliminary

investigations were done to determine potential cost savings that will be compared against the Environmental Services Treasury Memo and 2006 Capital Budget Submission; where the preliminary estimates of individual purchases were estimated at \$245,000.

As a result of the investigations we have found that tendering them as a group of 6 could result in a cost avoidance of approximately \$20,000 if purchased in 2005 for immediate delivery.

In summary, if the (6) vehicles were tendered and purchased immediately the City can expect to avoid;

- \$32,500 in required maintenance costs from current 2005 operating budgets,
- approx. 50% of the annual maintenance costs or \$10,450 from the 2006 operating budget,
- as a result of tendering the (6) vehicles together (now estimated at \$225,000) potentially save \$20,000 on a bulk purchase,
- a total estimated cost avoidance of \$62,950.

In addition to the cost avoidance, the six vehicles can be auctioned off with the value being credited to the vehicle services reserve account.

Alternatives

Approve the recommendations within this report.

Do not approve the recommendations within this report but recommend repair of vehicles through the appropriate operating budgets.

Financial Implications:

Costs associated with the vehicle purchases are funded through the vehicle/equipment reserve account.

Report:

Origin

Following staff discussion on budgetary issues surrounding fleet matters in the wrap up of 2004 Operating Budget and preparation of the 2005 Operating Budget, staff has reviewed the current replacement needs of the City's fleet. This needs analysis provides an update of previous planning work undertaken in this regard in the past.

Analysis

Through an analysis of the City's fleet, the Roads and Transportation Supervisor, in conjunction with Treasury staff determined a life expectancy, replacement schedule and "value" of the fleet. The City currently has 180 pieces of equipment in its fleet. Of these 55 are licensed and 45 are construction/horticultural type vehicles, and the balance is made up of small pieces of operating equipment such as mowers, chainsaws, large power hand tools, etc. The annual fee for licensing our equipment in 2004 was \$10,555.

The analysis provides a life expectancy for all units. Licensed and construction type vehicles were given a life expectancy varying between 8 and 20 years, with 8 years being the life expectancy of a pick-up truck or passenger vehicle and 20 years the life expectancy of our motor grader. Most of the medium duty trucks have a life expectancy of around 12 years. Similarly, transit vehicles have a life of 8 to 15 years, depending on the type of equipment.

Based on 2004 replacement dollars, the fleet has a value of \$10.3 million, not including those units with a value of less than \$10,000. Of this equipment, \$3.3 million worth of fleet/equipment is either due or past due for replacement if the above life expectancy is followed.

The attached spreadsheet lists the fleet and its age, life expectancy, scheduled replacement year and 2004 value. Additionally, this spreadsheet shows the annual maintenance costs of each piece of equipment.

Financial Considerations

The City's fleet is worth approximately \$10.5 million and there is about \$3.5 million worth of outstanding replacement needs. In round 1 of the 2005 Capital Budget \$400,000, was allotted for replacement and \$100,000 from tax revenue. It is recommended that during round 2 of the 2005 Capital Budget, Council consider a further expenditure of an additional \$220,000 for fleet replacement, \$100,000 of which is from tax revenue.

Not withstanding the immediate fleet need for \$3.5 million in replacement value, the City needs to set aside approximately \$1 million a year (in 2004 dollars) for the replacement of the existing fleet within the estimated life expectancy of 8 to 20 years. This does not address the needs for new additional vehicles as a result of growth in the City which are included in the calculation of the City wide Development Charges and which contribute to the funding of the Development Charges Reserve Fund.



Alderman Barwick has referred your request regarding the City's projected long-term debt position to me for a response.

During 2005 we issued long-term debt in the amount of \$8 million for the purpose of funding the \$12 million Community Centre Complex. Coupled with our existing debt, we project long-term debt of approximately \$8.8 million at the end of this year.

Early in 2006 we will be borrowing approximately \$18 million to finance the new Valleyview Home for the Aged. Combining the projected balance of this debt issue with the Community Centre Complex as well as the City's existing debt, we project long-term debt of approximately \$24.4 million at the end of 2006.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that:

- 1. The Adult Crossing Guard location at Edward Street and Balaclava Street in the City of St-Thomas be withdrawn, with the last day being Friday October 28, 2005; and,
- The area School boards be requested to annually provide individual school boundary and walking student information to allow the joint creation of a Safe Route to School program for the City of St-Thomas; and,
- 3. Warrant needs of the remaining Adult Guard locations be updated based on the Ministry of Transportation / Ontario Traffic Conference Manual School Crossing Review (1992); and,
- 4. Any other options for providing an Adult Guard Program be explored; and,
- 5. Any further revisions to the Adult Crossing Guard program be reported back to Council for approval.

Report:

Origin

The Environmental Services Department, Roads and Transportation Section manage the Adult Crossing Guard Program in the City of St-Thomas. Adult Crossing Guards are employed by the City of St-Thomas and are members of Local 841 (part time unit) (crossing guards) of the Canadian Union of Public Employees.

There are currently (9) Adult Crossing Guard locations in St. Thomas at the intersections of:

- Elm Street and Park Avenue
- Edward Street and Balaclava Street
- First Avenue and Myrtle Street
- Ross Street and Locust Street
- Forest Avenue and Park Avenue
- Fairview Avenue and Forest Avenue
- Fairview Avenue and Airey Avenue
- South Edgeware and Dalewood Drive
- Wellington Street and Park Avenue

In order to run the program efficiently, there is a need for (9) full time guards and (3) spare guards. The spare guards are effectively on-call to fill in for illness etc. throughout the School year. At the present time, there are (8) active full time guards (one guard is on disability) and (1) spare guard (filling in for the disability). This leaves the program short by (1) full time and (2) spare guards.

For the past several weeks the City has been advertising locally and through all available means to recruit crossing guards with very little response. Filling positions has become an increasingly difficult process due to lack of interest.

Analysis

Other than the initial warrant needs and assessment and annual time of day changes, the Guard locations have not been subjected to testing updates in accordance with standard Ontario justification methods for a number of years. Once tested, some locations may not continue to meet the technical justification.

An obvious example of this is at the Edward and Balaclava intersection where an All-Way Stop condition was installed in the summer of 2004. One of the key components of the justification criteria is

that of pedestrian delay and adequate gaps for crossing. An All-Way Stop condition provides adequate gaps for pedestrians to cross each time a car stops and therefore there are more than enough adequate gaps in this situation.

The full technical justification for adult crossing guard posts can be found in the Ministry of Transportation / Ontario Traffic Conference Manual – School Crossing Review (1992) (a 78 page document) which provides uniform implementation for Municipalities in Ontario. Within the manual the following key recommendation (page 3, # 4.4) was originally made;

"A School Crossing is a form of traffic control where School pupils are supervised in order to facilitate a safe crossing of the roadway at a location other than a traffic signal, a pedestrian crossover, a stop sign or a yield sign."

It is for this reason that removing the Adult Crossing Guard at the corner of Edward Street and Balaclava Street is recommended. The first step in assessing the City of St-Thomas needs for Adult Guards is to get timely and accurate information from the School boards. We need to know where the students are coming from and going to in order to establish the most efficient network of Adult Crossing Guard locations.

Alternatives

Maintain the existing nine (9) guard locations until a complete review of all locations is completed.


