REPORT:

On October 2nd, 2006, Council held a public meeting with regards to a proposed zoning by-law amendment which would permit the Early Learning Centre to develop lands on the southeast corner of Burwell Road and Ron McNeil Line for the purposes of a day nursery facility and a private school. The by-law in support of this proposal has been placed on the October 10th, 2006 Council Agenda.

The subject lands to that proposed amendment were the same lands for which an application was made by Inn Services Inc. in 2003 for a zoning amendment to support commercial development in a vacant land condominium format. The commercial proposal by Inn Services Inc. was never developed, however a site plan was approved (SPC05-04) and a site plan agreement was executed between Inn Services Inc. and the City (Agreement No. 27-2004).

In order to facilitate the development of these lands for the Early Learning Centre proposal, Inn Services Inc. has requested that the site plan agreement for the proposed commercial development be rescinded (see attached letter). That agreement was authorized by Council through By-law 91-2004. A by-law to repeal By-law 91-2004 has been placed on the October 10th, 2006 Council Agenda.

The development of the subject lands for the day nursery and private school as proposed by the Early Learning Centre is also subject to site plan control. A new agreement with the Early Learning Centre will be required upon approval of their site plan by the Site Plan Committee.

Origin

Subject:

In 2005, Council, approved in principle, the Ridership Growth Strategy and Asset Management Plan for the transit system as prepared by IBI Group. Subsequently, an allocation of funding for the project was approved in the 2006 Capital Budget. As a result, a Request for Proposal, RFP, was issued to three pre-qualified area consultants to provide design, contract documents, inspection and contract administration for the Renovation of the Transit Terminal Building project.

The Request for Proposal closed at 2 p.m. on Thursday September 21, 2006.

<u>Analysis</u>

The following is a breakdown of submitted prices;

Bidder Number	Bidder	Proposal Cost Excluding GST
1	SPH Engineering Inc.	\$21,640.00
2	Donald F. Roughly & Associates Inc.	\$31,200.00
3	Thomas P. Rylett Limited	disqualified

After the public opening, the proposals were checked for mandatory response requirements and calculation errors. Purchasing and Environmental Services staff has reviewed the proposals and recommend award to the low bidder, SPH Engineering Inc. The proposal submitted by Thomas P. Rylett Limited, did not follow the pricing structure laid out in the RFP in that the firm submitted a cost of engineering for the project of 10% of the value of construction rather than a lump sum as required. This proposal was rejected a result.

SPH Engineering Inc. has successfully completed a number of projects in St. Thomas. Recently, this firm represented the City on the Pinafore Park Services Building project which is now nearing completion and prior to that, this firm completed the renovation of the Public Works building.

It is anticipated that the design of the project will be completed in the fall and winter of 2006/2007 and that construction will take place in 2007. Once tenders have been called and received for the construction of the project, a further report to Council will be sumitted recommending the successful contractor for the project, subject to Council approving an allocation in the 2007 Capital Budget for the construction of the project.

As directed by Council, SPH Engineering has been requested to provide additional estimates for the following additional work:

 a work plan for the design of the space required by the proposed transit functions, including ticket/pass sales, driver dispatch and paratransit bookings, to be provided at the old railway station

• a work plan for the design requirements to retain the 2nd floor of the transit terminal building for the purpose of providing file storage space

A further report to Council will be submitted once these estimates have been obtained.

Financial Considerations:

In the 2006 Capital Budget, City Council allocated a total of \$75,000 for transit improvements funded by the City's Provincial Gas Tax allocation. This allocation includes \$25,000 for the design, contract documents, inspection and contract administration for the Renovation of the Transit Terminal Building project.

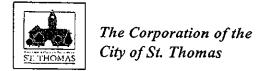

TREASURY POLICY AND PROCEDURES

SECTION:

SUBJECT:

TRAVEL AND CAR ALLOWANCE POLICY

Purpose

To outline the reasonable expenses covered while a Council member or employee is conducting authorized City business, or representing the City at conferences, seminars or other such functions.

Policy Statement

Council Members or Employees incurring reasonable expenses while on authorized City business shall have those expenses reimbursed as outlined in this policy and in accordance with Council approved "Rules and Guidelines for Allowable Business Expenses".

OUT OF TOWN TRAVEL

Regularly scheduled conferences/courses/seminars/ workshops, planned to be attended by Department Heads or subordinates each year, are to be included in the annual departmental budget.

Advances for conferences/courses/seminars/workshops must be requested on the proper claim form in time to meet the deadline for the normal processing of accounts payable cheques.

A detailed expense account is to be submitted to the applicable Department Head or to the City Treasurer in the case of Department Heads, on the proper authorized claim form (Appendix "A"), within five (5) days of returning from the conference, course, seminar or Workshop.

Allowable reasonable expenses incurred will include:

- a) Detailed Receipts are required for <u>all</u> expenditures.
- b) Actual cost of meals up to \$60.00 per day.
- c) Accommodation charges at the conference/courses/ Seminar/workshop hotel/motel, on the basis of the conference/course/seminar/workshop rate or the government hotel rate for a single room.
- d) Conference/course/seminar/workshop registration fee.
- e) Reasonable gratuities.
- f) Travel by rail, air or automobile, at the lowest quoted cost.

In determining the cost of vehicle travel, mileage is to be based on 45¢ per kilometer.

Generally speaking, the use of a vehicle is to be restricted to points within a (242) kilometer radius of St. Thomas, or to points not readily accessible by rail or air transportation.

IN-TOWN TRAVEL

Vehicle mileage expense accounts relating to personal vehicle usage, are to be submitted to the applicable Department Head or the City Treasurer in the case of Department Heads, on the proper authorized monthly mileage form (Appendix "B") in the first week of each month, providing full details of the actual mileage traveled during the preceding month. Payment will be made at the current mileage rates on the first A/P cheque run after the claim is submitted.

When an employee proceeds on the City business directly from his/her residence, actual kilometers will be reimbursed for:

- a) residence to business site, or
- b) normal office to business site, whichever is the

In-Town Travel cont.

Reimbursement for in-city driving will be at 45¢ per kilometer

Note: All mileage rates will be reviewed annually.

Staff members receiving payments under the provision of this travel policy (reimbursement for use of personal vehicles for City business) are required to meet the following conditions, to be authorized to use personal vehicles on City business:

- a) Hold a valid Ontario driver's license that is not under suspension
- b) Not drive their vehicle on City business while under the influence of alcohol or illicit drugs or prescription drugs, if the prescription drugs might impair the employee's driving ability.
- c) Maintain public liability and property damage insurance in the amount of at least \$1,000,000 and be able to produce proof of this insurance, if so requested by the City Treasurer
- d) Maintain their vehicles in a reasonable state of repair, so as not to expose the City to any undue risk of claims, when the vehicle is being used for City business.

- That the sources of funding for the cost of these road intersection construction projects be the City Wide Development Charges Reserve Fund, Capital Projects Reserve and unbudgeted capital levy to be identified in the September 30, 2006 budget monitoring report per the sources of funding table presented in the body of this Report.

Origin:

- The Phase I development of the Orchard Park Subdivision by the Tarry Group will require that a new road intersection be created along Elm Street at Peach Tree Boulevard, a new major collector road that will collect the internal traffic that will be generated by the proposed new neighbourhood subdivision development and which will also connect in the future to Raven Avenue within the adjoining Applewood Subdivision.
- Similarly, the Phase I development of the Dalewood Meadows Subdivision on the former Verhoef lands by Inn Services Inc., will require that a new road intersection be created along Ron McNeil Line at Pine Valley Drive, a new major collector road that will collect the internal traffic that will be generated by this proposed new neighbourhood subdivision development and which will also connect in the future to Greenway Boulevard within the adjoining Dalewood Landing Subdivision.
- A plan showing both intersection locations is attached herewith for the information of the Members.
- The subdivision agreements for both Phase I developments require that the Subdivider construct these intersections. The cost of the construction of these intersections is included in the City-wide development charges by-law as well as in the City-wide Development Charges Reserve Fund.
- The purpose of this report is to obtain Council approval to create a capital account for each of these intersection construction projects, such that the payment for these works, which are external to each subdivision development, may be made upon these intersection works being completed by each Subdivider respectively. The proposed works need to be initiated immediately either as an engineering design project or as a construction project in conjunction with the imminent servicing of the first phases of the subject new neighbourhood developments. (Orchard Park, Dalewood Meadows).

Analysis:

Peach Tree Boulevard/Elm Street

At the August 21, 2006 meeting of Council, the inclusion of this new road intersection project in the schedule of projects, included in the Development Charge Background Study, was approved. A budget of \$150,000 was allocated for the construction of this intersection.

21 -

In addition, this intersection construction project should be complemented by the re-construction of a short section of Elm Street (approximately 100m) between Neal Avenue and Peach Tree Boulevard, in order to create the continuity of a reconstructed arterial roadway environment of Elm Street between these two road intersections and also to permit the easterly extension of a number of underground and aboveground services (sanitary sewers, looping of electrical service, trunk telephone line etc) along this portion of Elm Street. The cost of this roadwork is estimated at \$150,000 and is also included in the Development Charge Background Study.

As mentioned above, this road and intersection construction work should be undertaken in conjunction with the construction of a new sanitary sewer extension easterly from Neal Avenue. Consistent with City policy, the installation of this sanitary sewer extension on Elm Street between Neal Avenue and the new Peach Tree Boulevard intersection would need to be initiated either as a Local Improvement project or under Sections 391/400 of the Municipal Act and Ontario Regulation OR244/02.

The cost of the sanitary sewer work would therefore be recovered from the benefiting property owners on Elm Street. A further report by Environmental Services Engineering Staff will be submitted to Council to initiate this concurrent sewer extension project.

Finally, the proposed road intersection improvement works on Elm Street may require that a 3m road widening be acquired on both sides of Elm Street at the proposed intersection and/or along the subject road section.

Ron McNeil Line/Pine Valley Drive Intersection

The creation of a new road intersection at Ron McNeil Line (County of Elgin arterial road with a posted speed limit of 80km/hr) and Pine Valley Drive, a new major collector road within the Dalewood Meadows Block Plan of Subdivision will require that additional road widening and taper work be undertaken along Ron McNeil Line to create a properly operating road intersection and a safe roadway environment.

The construction cost of this road intersection including engineering and excluding contingencies is \$356,000.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The total cost of above noted road intersection construction projects is estimated at \$380,000 (Elm Street/Peach Tree Boulevard) and \$400,000 (Ron McNeil Line/Pine Valley Drive) respectively. Neither of the two projects was included in the 2006 Capital Budget since the planning, design and cost estimating phase of these development has been undertaken subsequent to 2006 Capital Budget approval. Ideally these requests for project initiation and funding would be referred to the 2007 Capital Budget – Part 1 for Council consideration at that time. The introduction and approval of individual capital projects outside of the normal budgeting and priority setting process is dangerous and not normally recommended. *

If Council deems it essential that both projects be initiated immediately and in advance of the 2007 Capital Budget – Part 1 process, we would recommend the following sources of funding:

Elm Street/Peach Tree Boulevard sources of funding

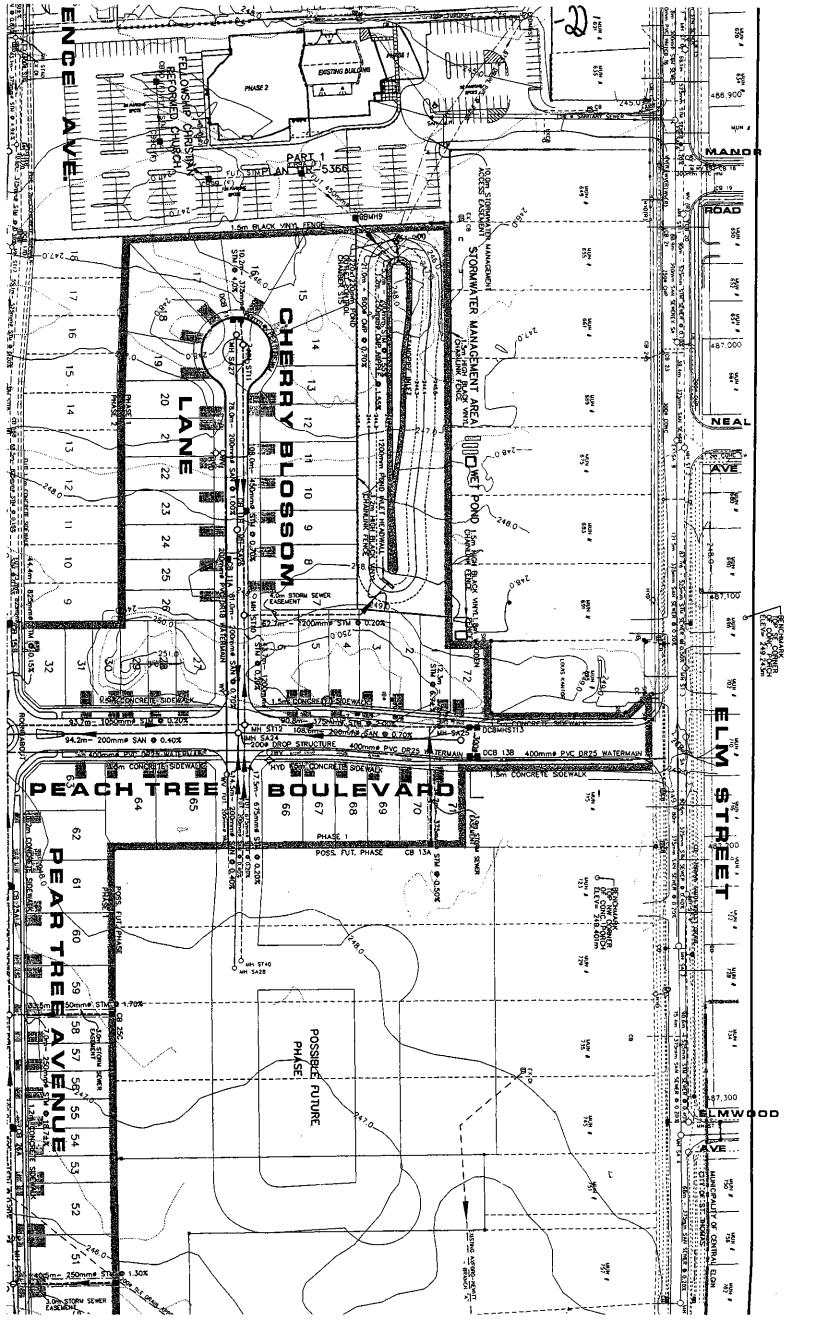

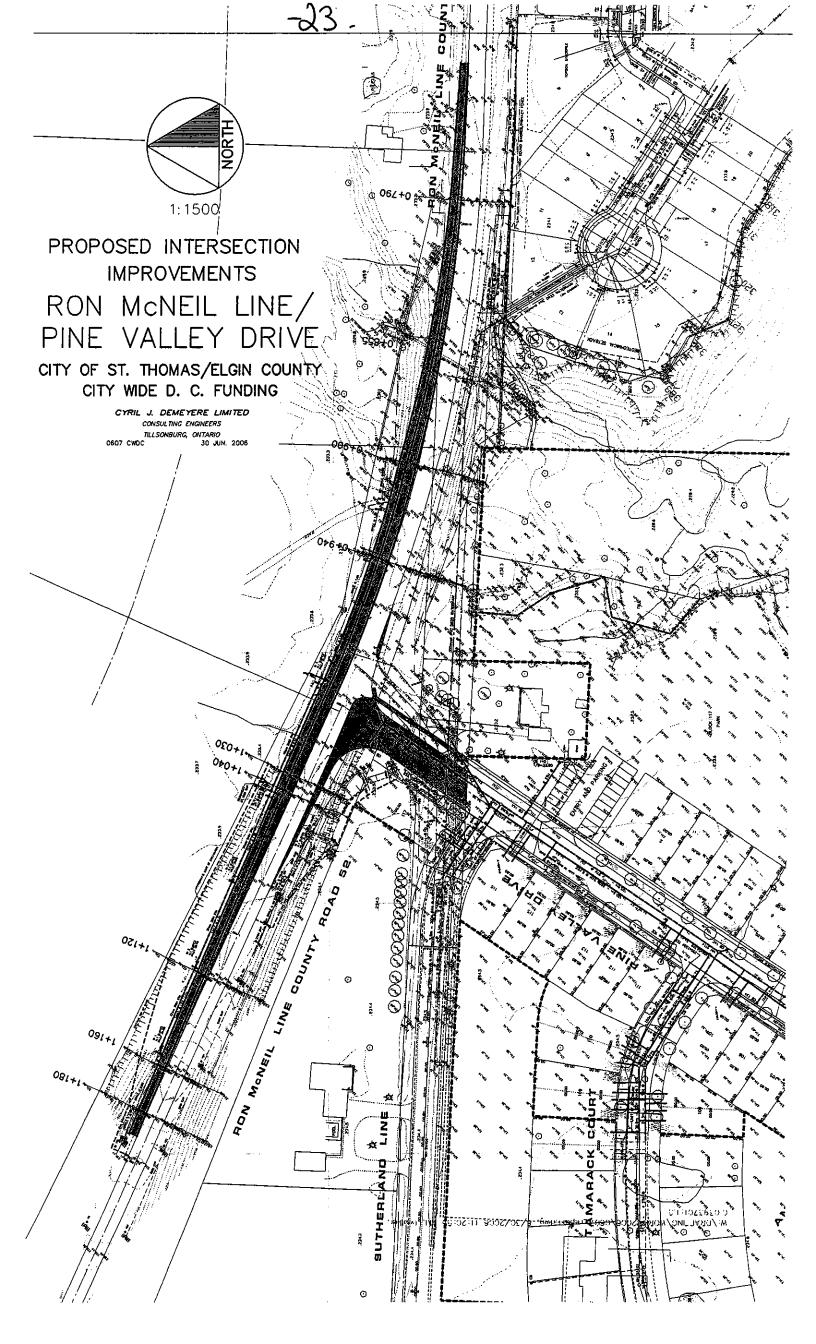

Furthermore, should Council approve the initiation of the projects at this time, it is recommended that a capital project account for each of these development driven projects be created and that these project accounts be funded with these respective amounts out of the appropriate service envelopes of the City Wide Development Charges Reserve Fund and allocation of the above noted complementary sources of funding required to pay for the non-residential share of the cost of these Development Charges funded works.

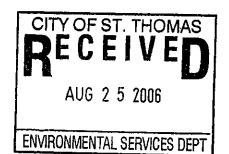

Dear Members of St. Thomas City Council:

We are seeking your approval to hold a fund-raising event called "Wings & Wheels" at the St. Thomas Municipal Airport June 22, 23 & 24, 2007.

For decades Southern Ontario has been renowned as a centre for aviation excellence - as an aviation-training centre for its role in the Commonwealth Air Training Plan during WWII to some of the best-attended and most spectacular air shows in the world.

In addition, Southern Ontario is famous for its automobile manufacturing facilities and its ongoing love affair with the great classic cars of the 20th and 21st centuries.

We propose to combine these two passions in a show called "Wings & Wheels", exhibiting the beauty and grace of some of the world's most spectacular aircraft, including the world's best military team - the Canadian Forces "Snowbirds"- with a selection of elite classic cars and Canadian Forces military vehicles showcased at the

St. Thomas Municipal Airport.

Combine the draw of an air show with the exploding Car Cruisin' and Classic Car show scene and, add in the support of Canadians for our Armed Forces and you have got something really spectacular for St. Thomas and region.

Not only will spectators see an impressive air show, but also will experience some of the most exciting aircraft and classic cars and military vehicles up close and personal, parked side-by-side.

We bring to this project a host of organizers determined to put on a safe, family-friendly show to make St Thomas proud.

Of course, our motivation is to raise funds for our primary charity, St John Ambulance (St. Thomas and London Branches) and our secondary charities, Jesse's Journey, The Air Cadet League of Canada and The RCAF Associations. We are non-profit, and all of our funds after expenses will be donated to the above charities.

A financial contribution from your Council is not required.

The majority of fuel sales will be the domain of the St-Thomas municipal airport. The criteria for aircraft that will base at the airport will be coordinated with the airport Superintendent.

We have an experienced and enthusiastic team of individuals who have come together to make this happen:

- The idea was originated by Tom Lawson, Honorary Colonel of 22 London Service Battalion, a component of 31 Brigade. Also Tom is Chair of the Senate of Honorary Snowbirds and President and CEO of Empire Aviation. The Lawson name is known throughout Canada for philanthropy and public service.
- A Ed Holder, President of Stevenson and Hunt Insurance. Ed Holder's resume for public service would occupy three more pages here. Sufficient to say that many, many fundraising ventures in recent years in London and area would not have been successful were it not for the dedication of Ed Holder. Both gentlemen play a prominent role with St John Ambulance. They will jointly hold the title "Director-Wings & Wheels".
- A Peter Garland, a broadcaster known through out this area was recruited to serve as Executive Director. Peter served as an air show director for ten years and is a former 12 -year member of the RCAF. Peter is the President of the Board at Jesse's Journey, The Foundation for Gene and Cell Therapy.
- ▲ Gerry Vanderhoek, Regional Manager for Air Canada Jazz, is our military aircraft coordinator. Gerry has acted in this role for many previous air shows and currently volunteers with the Halifax Air Show in that capacity.
- △ Don Hunter, a classic car show organizer and owner of the Husky Travel Centre on the 401 east is our "Wheels" coordinator, responsible for the display of some of the world's most fascinating automobiles.
- ▲ Col. Rick Phillips is our military "wheels" coordinator who will be succeeded by Col. Kevin Doyle. They are the out-going and incoming Chiefs of Staff of 31 Brigade, London. They will coordinate the display of Canadian Forces military vehicles, classic and 21st century. They will also arrange for a Canadian Forces Recruiting display to be on-site.
- A Brian Reynolds, Executive Director St John Ambulance is our <u>business manager</u>.
- ▲ Deborah McGee, Treasurer with St. John Ambulance will act as <u>treasurer</u>.

In addition, and most importantly, we are fortunate to have a host of enthusiastic and experienced air show/car show volunteers from previous London and St. Thomas shows from which to draw to help organize every facet of a successful Wings & Wheels Show.

Some of the sponsors who have enthusiastically endorsed the Wings & Wheels concept include Diamond Aircraft, Shell Canada, and the Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation (Slots at Western Fair).

Sponsorships are being sought and a descriptive sponsorship package is included here for your examination.

We are enthusiastic about the St Thomas Airport as our site because:

- The aviation history associated this area -specifically, RCAF Detachment St. Thomas, and its history as part of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan
- The site itself with ample parking and spectator viewing areas
- The proximity to major arteries providing for an efficient traffic flow in and out
- The close location to downtown St Thomas and its variety of restaurants and other venues
- The lack of 'commercial flight' show interruption. (e.g. In London, the air shows came to a complete halt while commercial aircraft landed or took off. This makes for a very long air show not "family-friendly" on a sunny, hot day.)
- Note: the relatively shorter runway at St. Thomas Airport is no problem for Wings &
 Wheels as those participating flying aircraft needing a longer runway will stage out of
 London. The Snowbirds will land and be base at St Thomas Municipal Airport for the
 duration of the show.

Our Operations Plan will cover every aspect: safety, security, traffic, parking, admissions, concessions, emergency procedures, fire, police and EMS Services and more. As stated above, volunteers experienced in the various components will follow this plan meticulously. We will be meeting with Mr.Arndt and local area Fire, Police and EMS services committee to discuss their involvement.

The Ops Plan will be re-vamped to suit the needs and requirements of St Thomas Municipal Airport. This will be done with the guidance of Mr. Dale Arndt and his Snowbirds Show (May 2006) Committee. We want to involve and make use of the expertise of the St. Thomas Snowbird Show Committee.

We will be fully insured through Marsh Canada for \$20,000,000. The Corporation of the City of St-Thomas and the Municipality of Central Elgin will be named as an additional insured and any other relevant community participant will be included.

We are budgeting for an anticipated crowd of 20,000 over the run of the show. We expect that there is a good chance we would exceed this, weather permitting of course. Our plan involves a preview 'Hour of Power' on the Friday evening so that eager fans can catch some arriving aircraft and cars, followed by the complete Saturday and Sunday shows encompassing a 9 a.m. gate opening, a 1-3pm air show and car viewing all day. The gates would close at 5 p.m. each day.

The food concessions, beer tent operators and souvenir vendors will pay an up-front fee to our charities. Ample restroom facilities will be provided. Our volunteer Air Cadet Squadrons will complete thorough clean-up sweeps of the grounds.

Through extensive consultation and planning with local experts we will formulate an efficient traffic control system. Traffic, admission and parking volunteers will be numerous, drawn from local Air Cadet Squadrons, volunteers from our other charities, augmented and supervised by Wings & Wheels committee members.

A comprehensive media budget has been set aside for marketing and promotion. These events have proven in the past to be of great interest to the media, generating far more publicity than is actually purchased. We believe that you can be assured of excellent media coverage for St. Thomas and Elgin County leading up to this show.

It is hoped that Corus Radio London - CFPL AM980, FM96, The Hawk and Fresh FM will come on board as one of the major media sponsors.

We feel that the tourism and exposure opportunities for St. Thomas and Elgin County are extraordinary, and will be holding meetings with Elgin and St Thomas Tourism representatives to see how we can best co-promote this great event.

We believe we have a great team prepared to bring a major event to St. Thomas and Elgin County for a number of great causes and we look forward towards making this a great cooperative venture here in Southwestern Ontario.

Included is a completed application to the special events Committee.

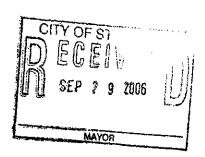
