RECOMMENDATION:

THAT: Report PD-29-2007 be received;

THAT: Council, pursuant to Section 34(10.4) of the Planning Act, R.S.O., 1990 as amended, direct the Clerk to notify the applicant (Cara Sedlacek) that the information and material required under Subsections 34(10.1) and (10.2) of the Act has been provided and the application is thereby considered complete;

THAT: Direction be given to prepare a site specific draft amendment to the Zoning By-law to permit a clinic as an additional permitted use on lands located at 206 Centre Street, which lands may be legally described as Lot 1, Plan 3, City of St. Thomas, County of Elgin;

AND THAT: A public meeting be set for October 9th, 2007 @ 6:50 p.m. in accordance with Ontario Regulation 545/06.

ORIGIN:

Cara Sedlacek has made application to amend the City of St. Thomas Zoning By-law 50-88 to permit a clinic as an additional permitted use within the existing building located at 206 Centre Street. Staff have reviewed the application and all supporting documentation provided by the applicant and are satisfied that the application is complete relative to the requirements of Subsections 34(10.1) and (10.2) of the Planning Act, R.S.O., 1990 as amended. Staff are recommending that Council, pursuant to Section 34(10.4) of the Act, notify the applicant that the application is considered complete.

ANALYSIS:

Proposal:

The subject lands currently contain an existing two-storey dwelling that has been converted into three units. Two units occupy the easterly half of the building, known municipally as 208 Centre Street. It is proposed by the applicant to convert the westerly portion of the existing building, known municipally as 206 Centre Street, into a clinic. The applicant, who is the owner of the subject lands, is proposing that

the clinic will offer alternative therapy technics focussing on natural technics and products including contact reflex analysis, energy therapy (reiki, reflexology, therapeutic touch), hypno-therapy, aroma therapy and a naturopath. "Natural hair therapy" is another service to be offered to clients seeking natural, chemical-free hair and scalp treatments to compliment the other natural therapy services. The applicant advises that there will be three practitioners working on a regular full-time basis. Two other practitioners will work part time on evenings and weekends.

The existing land uses surrounding the subject property include commercial uses to the north and south, a mix of restricted business use (dental clinic) and residential uses to the west, and vacant lands to the east. The subject lands are rectangular in shape with approximately

SUBJECT NORTH LANDS Centre Street

19.23 metres of frontage on Princess Street, and may be legally described as Lot 1, Plan 3, City of St. Thomas. Known municipally as 120 Centre Street, the subject lands are shown outlined in bold on the Location Plan.

2005 Provincial Policy Statement (PPS):

The Provincial Policy Statement 2005 (PPS) provides policy direction on matters of provincial interest related to land use planning and development. The Planning Act requires that Council consider provincial interest when making planning decisions and to ensure that local planning decisions are consistent with" Provincial planning interests.

The subject land to the proposed amendments is located within an area predominated by existing commercial uses. The lands are serviced with full municipal sewer and water services.

I have reviewed the applicant's submission, which in accordance with new regulatory requirements provides information on how the Plan is consistent with Provincial interest. In this regard I am of the opinion that the proposed amendment to the By-law is consistent with Provincial interest as expressed in the current Policy Statement.

Official Plan Policies:

The subject property is located within the Office/Professional designation of the St. Thomas Official Plan. This designation permits that the predominant use of land shall be for professional offices. In my opinion, Council may consider the proposed amendment to the Zoning By-law without requiring an amendment to the Plan.

Zoning By-law:

The subject property is currently located within the Restricted Commercial Zone (C8) of the City of St. Thomas Zoning By-law 50-88. The C8 zone permits, among other things, restricted business office uses. The definition from the By-law for "restricted business office" states that it does not include "...any business defined or included within any other definition...". A clinic is separately defined within the Bylaw. Therefore, in my opinion a site specific amendment to the By-law is required in order to permit a clinic use as an additional permitted uses on the subject lands as proposed by the applicant.

The subject lands are subject to site plan control.

The standards of the by-law require that, based on the floor area of the proposed clinic, the applicant provide a minimum of three parking spaces dedicated to the use. While this may meet the minimum standards of the by-law, it may not meet the minimum requirements of the proposed use given the potential number of practitioners who will share the facility (5). The applicant advises that the owner of

letter), which will be of assistance for parking practitioners.
Clients have a few options nearby for parking. On-street parking within the immediate area includes approximately five 2-hour spaces on the south side of Centre Street and approximately nine 10-hour spaces on the north side of Centre Street, all between Princess and White Street. The City-owned White Street lot located on the north side of the railway tracks contains a further fourteen 2-hour spaces. It is recognized that these are all public parking spaces with no guarantees as to availability on any given day.

THAT: Council receive Report TR 38-07, entitled "A Day Out with Thomas ~ Summary of Event Charges" as information.

Report

Background

At the City Council Meeting of August 13, 2007, Members passed a resolution directing staff to prepare a report detailing the charges relating to the "A Day out with Thomas" event.

On the weekends of July 20 to 22 and July 27 to 29, 2007, the Elgin County Railway Museum Committee hosted "A Day Out with Thomas" for the third consecutive year. Due to several factors, the Committee approached the City about the possibility of holding the event at the St. Thomas-Elgin Memorial Centre and parking lot, rather than its previous location at the CASO rail station.

Meetings were held with City staff (Recreation Services, Arena, and Property Maintenance) and event organizers to ensure the needs of the event could be properly met at this new venue, and to determine the related facility fees (listed on Special Event Checklist, Appendix "A"). In order to accommodate the administrative, training, and set-up requirements, as well as the event itself with its projected 18,000 visitors, the organizers requested access to various areas of Memorial Centre as early as July 2. The roofing contract under way at Memorial Arena was placed on hiatus July 16 and a community ball hockey league was relocated to Timken Centre on certain nights, so that the arena floor could be accessed by organizers and volunteers.

It was concluded that the Memorial facilities were available as requested and would satisfy the event requirements. Accordingly, an Indoor Facility Permit was issued and signed (Appendix "B"). Endorsed by City Council and approved by the Special Events Committee, it was announced "A Day Out with Thomas" would be held at Memorial Centre on the two final weekends of July.



Background:

On June 14, 2007 Mayor Barwick and the City Clerk were invited to attend a meeting at the St. Thomas Elgin General Hospital to discuss the possibility of forming a City – County wide medical professional recruitment partnership in an effort to coordinate health recruitment across the region and to position the area to attract health professionals.

Subsequent to the initial meeting a second meeting was held and the local development community (Home Builders Association) was invited to attend as it was felt that the development community has a direct interest to ensure the area has a good compliment of health professionals in order to attract new families into the area.

As a result of the two initial meetings to discuss a potential partnership, the attached brief has been prepared providing details about a potential partnership.

Key elements to consider in relation to a potential partnership are:

- A governance Committee would be established to oversee the recruitment activities composed
 of representatives from each of the stakeholder groups.
- A health professional recruiter would be hired
- This initiative would be establish as a two year pilot program
- Annual budget estimates have been defined as \$130,000 for the partnership.
- Estimated costs to the City for the balance of 2007 are \$9,500

<u>ST. THOMAS – ELGIN MEDICAL RECRUITMENT PARTNERSHIP</u> **PROPOSAL**

The need to attract medical professionals, especially family physicians, for the St. Thomas / Elgin area is an ongoing concern.

In the past recruitment efforts have been undertaken in a variety of forms including direct recruitment efforts through the hospital, part-time efforts by individuals such as Dr. Don Lawrence and a host of localized efforts across the County particularly in East and West Elgin.

Through some analysis medical staff at the hospital have observed the fact that a significant percentage of patients using the emergency services at the hospital are orphans in terms of not having a family doctor. Further, it is estimated that 14 family doctors are required to meet the needs of the St. Thomas - Elgin County area. To add urgency to this matter, the pending retirement of existing family doctors within the County is on the horizon which would leave thousands more without a doctor.

To develop and implement a strategic plan aimed at recruiting medical practitioners a partnership is being proposed with the City of St. Thomas, the County of Elgin and the St. Thomas Elgin General Hospital. The cornerstone of this recruitment process with be the retention of a recruitment officer.

In addition, as the provision of family physicians is an important quality of life issue to attract families, business and industry to the St. Thomas / Elgin County area a direct vested interest for the development community to participate in the recruitment process is being encouraged. Financial participation and representation from the development community is being recommended for this effort.

The importance of having a dedicated recruitment officer will provide the vehicle for specific activities to be undertake to generate interest in the area including the Provinces annual health recruitment tour, the summer student camp, liaison with the medical school at the University of Western Ontario and most importantly, building positive relationships with prospective medical professional who show an interest in the area.

KEY CONSIDERATION

That the City of St. Thomas, the County of Elgin the St. Thomas Elgin General Hospital and the development community implement a coordinated medical recruitment effort for the St. Thomas- Elgin County area.

GOVERNANCE

That the Mayor of St. Thomas, Elgin County's Warden, a Board member of the hospital and a member of the development community form a Committee mandated with the task of coordinating a health recruitment process.

<u>IMMEDIATE TASKS</u>

- 1. Approval to establish the partnership.
- 2. Commitment to a budget allocation for an initial two year period.
- Hire a recruitment officer
 Develop two year strategic plan
- 5. Recruitment to be aimed at a variety of health professionals required within the St. Thomas / Elgin County area.


